

In BC, children can start kindergarten the year they are 5 years **old by December 31.** While most children start school the year they turn 5, families may choose to wait and start kindergarten the year their child turns 6 years old by December 31.

If a family is considering waiting until their child is 6 years old to start kindergarten, it is advised that they speak to their local school principal directly to ask questions, gather information, and understand the possible implications waiting to start kindergarten may have later in a child's K-12 journey. Once families have gathered all the information, they are able to make the best decision for when their child will start kindergarten.

Kindergarten programs are supportive of ALL children, whether they are still four years old or approaching age six when they start school. The learning outcomes in kindergarten recognize and celebrate that students reach their developmental milestones at different ages. In kindergarten, ALL children are given opportunities to learn and develop new social and academic skills with their peers in an inclusive, caring, and safe classroom setting.
